Friends of Niger Flood Response

Friends of Niger worked through member contacts to identify 5 groups looking for assistance with flood relief work, allocating \$1700 to each group. Here is another report of results.

Malaria prevention and treatment in Mont Bagzane Integrated Health Centre - Agadez region.

This project was facilitated by Myriam Kaplan-Pasternak, new board member and health/nutrition volunteer in Guidimouni, Niger from 1983-85. Through her contacts with ADESS- Association pour le Développement de l'Education et la Sauvegarde de la Santé the request for flood relief was funded to provide support to 32 villages in the remote region. Thanks to generous FON donors we sent \$1700 and an additional \$1,000 from DG Educational Services made possible the purchase of medicine and mosquito nets in Agadez and their distribution in the Mont Bagzam plateau region.

The funding provided medicine specifically to treat mild to moderate cases of malaria in three medical facilities with the goal of reducing the number of patients needing to be evacuated for treatment. Additionally 750 mosquito nets were purchased and given to 600 families to protect 1500 individuals – as typically 3 people sleep under 1 net.

At the end of the season they reported that they were able to treat 208 people for Malaria. And only one person had a severe case of malaria that required evacuation to hospital in Agadez, a very rough 6 hour drive.







The people of BAGZAM greatly appreciated the assistance and hope that members of FON will come to visit someday.

Presidential Elections in Niger

Salam Aleykum, Bonjour, Ina koinan ku, Mata Anran Kani, Wayiwan,

On 27 December 2020, Niger voted in presidential and legislative elections that could see the West African country's first democratic transition of power since independence in 1960. None of the candidates were able to have the majority votes to win. Therefore, a second vote is scheduled in February between Bazoum Mohamed who was the former head of Niger's interior and foreign ministries, and former President Mahaman Ousmane. Bazoum has promised to build boarding schools for girls to encourage them to stay in school longer, which he said would help reduce child marriage in a country with many teenage pregnancies (We'll see, fingers crossed sometimes candidates don't keep their promises).

Some 7.4 million Nigeriens were registered to vote to elect legislators and the successor to President Mahamadou Issoufou who has served two terms. He's stepping down, allowing the first peaceful transfer of power between two elected presidents since Niger became independent from France in 1960. Niger has seen four coups since independence in 1960.

More than 6,800 observers from various organizations (National and International) are deployed around the country to supervise the elections. A peaceful transfer would be significant not only in Niger but also in Africa, where leaders recently have held on for disputed third terms in Guinea, Ivory Coast, Cameroon, Uganda, etc.


Elections results:

Mohammed Bazoum, of the ruling party, came first with 39.33 percent of the vote. Mahamane Ousmane, placed second with 16.99 percent of votes. Former Prime Minister Seini Oumarou was 3rd, Albadé Abouba, 4th, obtaining 8.95% and 7.07% of the votes, ahead of former Foreign Minister Ibrahim Yacouba, 5th with 5.38% of the votes respectively. Another candidate and also former president Salou Djibo, came in 6th with 2.99% of the vote. Voter turnout was pegged at 69.67%, with 5.2 million voters out of 7.4 million registered voters for a population of 23 million.

The two candidates are seeking alliances before the second round on February 21st. Read more:

Former Niger President Mamadou Tandja Dies At Age 82

The West African nation of Niger is observing three days of national mourning following the death of former President Mamadou Tandja at the age of 82. The government said Tuesday Tandja died in the capital, Niamey, but no cause of death was given. Tandja was twice elected president of Niger starting 1999 to 2010 before he was overthrown in a coup for attempting to change the constitution to hold on to power. His ouster paved the way for Issoufou Mahamadou to become president in the 2011 election.


1) Board of Directors News: grateful for active members! from President John Baird

2) Grant Making News and Project Opportunities

Friends of Niger is excited to be launching a call for proposals and competitive grant making process in May. We are moving to a twice yearly cycle to receive applications and award funds after a competitive review. The subtle shift will be toward more of a grant-making organization where our committee focuses on selecting projects to fund and sharing the results back with members, donors and the board. We reached out to other Friends of groups to borrow best practices and found that others are also retooling to compensate for the absence of PCVs in their host countries.

We reflected back on input you provided in recent surveys to put forward these values and priorities:

FON gives priority to projects that:

- Address a locally identified need
- Are feasible and likely to be successful
- Benefit many people
- Have community support and contributions
- Have a plan to sustain the benefits into the future
- Build local capacity and leadership
- Involve or engage FON member(s) and Niger diaspora
- Can be replicated and adopted by others

Here are some new opportunities for involvement of FON members in supporting project work.

PROJECT REVIEW – First, we will be asking for volunteers to help with the review and selection of projects using the detailed criteria we have developed. This revised process will create the opportunity for more folks to participate in project review without necessarily signing on for project management or oversight.

APPLICANT MENTORING—With the recognition that some applications will present ideas with merit, yet may not be ready for funding, we want to offer the possibility of identifying mentors to work with applicants to improve proposals. Mentoring would be a voluntary,

limited assignment to work with an applicant to improve a proposal or project idea. Offering this option to applicants will offer some capacity building and in the long run improve the caliber of applications and projects. We feel that this developmental function is best accomplished outside of the committee structure, leaving the committee dedicated to grant making and reporting.

We look forward to doing a test run of this new process and we welcome your involvement, your comments and suggestions.

Please note, at the moment we are focusing our attention on funding regular, planned projects and have not decided how we may proceed with more urgent type requests—stay tuned.

We can't leave this topic without recognizing the fantastic help of JoAnn Lewis, who has provided tons of insight and ideas for this effort. **Thank you JoAnn!**

3) Niger News Roundup

Elections

The new president, Bazoum Mohamed, 61-year-old former interior minister, won 55.75% of the votes against the opposition candidate Mahamane Ousmane who had 44.25%, according to CENI the Election Commission. Mahamane Ousmane, 71 yrs. old, was Niger's first democratically elected president in 1993 until he was toppled in a coup three years later. He contested the results and denounced an electoral hold-up. Right after the presidential results, violent protests erupted in the country especially in Niamey. Supporters of the losing presidential candidate set several buildings on fire, burned tires, and came into heavy exchanges with police.



This election marks the first peaceful transition of power between two democratically elected presidents in Niger.

Former president Mahamadou Issoufou promised that he will not try to change the constitution to remain in power. On February 21st, Issoufou stated that, ""I am proud to be the first democratically elected president in our history who will be handing over power to another democratically elected president."

Former president Issoufou, has been awarded the 2020 Ibrahim Prize for Achievement in African Leadership. The annual prize is granted by the Mo Ibrahim Foundation, named after the Sudanese billionaire businessman and philanthropist who founded it. The prize – which includes a US\$5 million award – aims to showcase exceptional role models from the continent and "recognize leaders who have strengthened democracy and human rights for the shared benefit of their people," Africa News.

The presidential election was dominated by the deaths of eight election officials in the Tillabéri Region, after a mine explosion. The President-elect faces many challenges, education, health, nutrition, poverty, security and corruption.

Terrorist Attack in Tillaberi Region

Terrorists have killed around 100 people in two villages in Tillaberi region. The attackers split into two columns to carry out simultaneous attacks on the two villages, which lie seven kilometers (four miles) apart.

The attacks on the villages of Tchoma Bangou and Zaroumadareye occurred on Saturday just as first-round presidential election results were announced. They were waged by terrorists who came riding about 100 motorcycles. The terrorists left 70 civilians dead in Tchoma Bangou and 30 dead in Zaroumadareye. The two villages are 120km (75 miles) north of the capital, Niamey.

The two villages are in the vast and unstable Tillaberi region, which is located in the "tri-border" area, where the porous borders of Niger, Mali and Burkina Faso converge. The area has suffered jihadist assaults for years.

Seven Nigerien soldiers were killed in an ambush in Tillaberi on 21 December. Travel by motorbike has been banned in Tillaberi since last January in a bid to prevent incursions by jihadists riding them. Terrorist Attack in Tahoua Region

Attacks by suspected jihadists in villages in Niger's Tahoua region have left 137 people dead, in another massacre that has underscored the huge security challenges facing new President Mohamed Bazoum. Gunmen arriving on motorbikes attacked the villages of Intazayene, Bakorat and Wistane near the border with Mali, shooting at everything which moved.

Niger's Tillaberi and Tahoua regions, bordering northern Mali, have been facing recurrent armed attacks since 2017 attributed to terrorist groups operating in northern Mali.

School Burning in Niamey

A fire fueled by high winds swept through an elementary school in Niamey, killing 20 children, hospital officials said Wednesday. The kids were attending class at the time the blaze erupted around 4 p.m. and quickly consumed the huts and damaged adjacent buildings. Straw huts that housed some of the

completely burned, while there was significant damage to the building itself, leaving scorched classroom furniture scattered in ash.

Straw huts are commonly used to make additional room for students in overcrowded schools throughout the country in urban and rural areas.

Schools chronically lack supplies and furniture to meet the demand, and forced to make do with children seated on the floor, sharing supplies and lacking books.

5) Zinder nonprofit entrepreneur looking for a business advisor



Ideally candidates would have skills or experience working with design/art work companies or organizations. Her goal is to promote establishment of small scale businesses founded by young Nigeriens based in Zinder, who have acquired a minimum of 10 ten years of formal schooling, an effort she is calling "AFRICAN Street Business School and Entrepreneurship Development Hub". She is planning to provide training followed by placing students in apprenticeship situations in order to provide more local employment opportunities for young people.

Binta, who is also pursuing a Master's Degree online, is hoping to be able to communicate with her chosen Business Advisors via some internet-based platform about every two weeks to get advice, coaching and mentorship for her program—and she speaks English for those of you whose French may have gone rusty.

Walking Each other Home Again, A young Peace Corps Volunteer in Niger, 1960's, and her return 30 years later

A Memoir by Laurie Oman

In her delightful and insightful memoir of a mid-century American girl coming of age as a new bride in a remote Hausa village, Laurie Oman generously shares a unique place and time that will live on in our hearts forever. We are right there with her as she fumbles and faux pas her way into the role of a valued member of the community as a health educator, unprepared emergency midwife, and ultimately trusted friend. So deep were the bonds from her two-year Peace Corps stay in the 1960s, that thirty years later she was invited to return to her beloved village. Thanks to 12 project reviewers we selected 4 projects to fund this time around. We have board member elections coming up soon, and there are always opportunities to serve on committees and do special projects. Please think about getting more involved with FON soon!

1) Friends of Niger Board update: Nominate yourself or other friends of Niger to the join the board

What does the FON Board of Directors do, you may ask?

We are representatives elected by you, and meet regularly to further FON's mission to connect our membership, support development in Niger, and advocate for the benefit of Niger. Our activities in the past year included:

- In the fall of 2020, we responded to the health and shelter needs occasioned by flooding in Niger with a successful special appeal to provide needed items such as malaria medications and bed nets.
- We followed up with multiple long-term projects we have supported in Niger.
- Despite COVID, we managed to gather for a Zoom retreat in October, where we learned more about the realities in Niger in the years since we have worked there, updated our mission statement, and laid the groundwork for an overhaul of the projects process
- We planned and implemented the new projects process, with a successful round in June of our now twice-yearly applications cycle. Our existing board members and committee members were joined by several volunteers from among our FON membership who gave their time to help review project applications.
- Throughout the year, we maintained careful accounting and financial oversight
 - We reached out to you all regularly through the 1) <u>Annual Member Letter</u>, 2) <u>Camel Express</u>, and 3) new Facebook Group

Would you like to be part of this interesting and important work?

It will soon be time to elect board members! We are looking for a few new board members to help us continue our existing efforts, and imagine ways to expand and improve the ways we serve our membership and fulfill our mission. New board members will be asked to commit to a two-year term, during which time they will participate in monthly full board meetings via Zoom, as well as work on at least one committee. We also welcome non-board members to help us with committee work, especially the projects committee, where we are in need of regular committee members to keep the projects process moving and improving, as well as volunteer reviewers who participate in 2-3 meetings over a brief period of time to help the committee evaluate the applications we receive. The next cycle of project applications is planned for November.

2) Four new projects funded after rigorous selection process

We are thrilled to announce funding for a new round of projects totaling approximately \$16,250*. Project selection was accomplished through our new, rigorous competitive process. Many thanks to our "Friends of" group colleagues, including Nepal, Tanzania and Burkina, and the Portland OR RPCV group, who shared ideas and information about how they select and fund projects. We cobbled together all the best ideas and we think our maiden voyage was a success. We received 22 applications for funding from a variety of groups and a wide range of projects. After sorting out 3 that did not meet basic eligibility criteria, a team of 12 volunteers reviewed and scored the remaining applications. Following lively debate and discussions, 4 applications were selected for funding. Those that were not selected received feedback on what we liked about their proposals and how they might be more competitive next time.

Many thanks are also due to JoAnn Lewis and Alix Barstow Fedoruk who contributed lots of thoughtful, constructive input to the new process. And **HIP HIP HOORAY** for the review team members: Mary Abrams, Ismaghil Ag Moussa, Steven Anderson, John Baird, Kimberly Dixon, Alix Barstow Fedoruk, JoAnn Lewis, Dane Miller, Yari Rabiou, Cheryl Turner, Pamela White, and Amy Wilson. *Please note \$ amounts shown here reflect the amount requested in cfa and are approximated in dollars; actual amounts are dependent on exchange rates.

PROJECTS ACCEPTED FOR FUNDING:

Tchizamene Clinic Solar Batteries & Beds, Organisation Vie et Développement ~ \$3,175 Organisation Vie et Développement demonstrated their cooperation in 2020 by implementing a FON small grant-funded emergency response project, providing medical supplies in the Agadez area. This successful proposal will replace 12 year-old batteries for the solar array for the health clinic and purchase 10 beds and mattresses. The clinic serves about 10,000 people in the Village of Tchizanmene, Commune of Dannat, Agadez Region. There are two nurses, one midwife and her assistant at the clinic. The batteries will improve capacity for refrigeration of essential medicines.

Bangiya Elementary School Desks, Bangiya Village Cooperative ~ \$1,401

The Cooperative in the village of Bangiya near Zinder has been awarded funding to supply a new classroom with desks. This project follows the successful implementation of a classroom construction project previously funded directly by individual members of FON in December 2020. FON Board

member Yari RABIOU has already delivered the funds for this project and visited the site while he was visiting in country in July 2021. The grant will fund the purchase of 30 table-benches for the Bangiya elementary school. (A video will be uploaded soon).

Sécurisation contre la chenille mineuse de l'épi du mil. Potentiel Terre ~ \$4,855

Potentiel Terre will implement a program to breed and reintroduce an indigenous wasp that attacks millet boring insects. The program will also provide training so that it can carry into the future with local people producing and distributing the wasps. As many as 20,000 households hope to benefit from a reduction of crop loss in the commune of Mokko.

Vocational Training for School Dropouts, Incarcerated and Unemployed Youth. Centre de Formation des Artisans de Maradi ~ \$5,000

The Centre de Formation des Artisans de Maradi is working with prison officials to provide youth training in various vocational programs. A 13-month program will be delivered for up to 20 participants for approximately \$350 each. Training will include literacy, technical writing, basic accounting and entrepreneurship to the trainees.

In other project news -

A \$10,000 grant to Kirker Foundation/Niger last year helped cover costs for ground transportation and delivery for a significant shipment of medical supplies. As with previous shipments, the medicines and supplies were selected in close cooperation with the Ministry of Health to ensure they are used appropriately throughout Niger's health care system, greatly expanding the capacity to meet the needs during the pandemic. Although Friends of Niger has historically been connected to Returned Peace Corps Volunteers, its membership is not exclusive. Most of these appear in Randolph Hobler's book 101 Arabian Tales: How We All Persevered in Peace Corps Libya. Write to us with you own thoughts about the value of Peace Corps, and we'll share in a follow-up article:

- O You never understand your own country until you've left it.
- Why if the United States is so serious about "Peace" is there is no cabinet position designated "Secretary of Peace"?
- o (unexpected consequence of participating in international volunteerism) The exposure to other sides of arguments, of realizing other valid points of view...and that in the U.S. on some topics we can be as close-minded as any ignorant person in a third-world country.
- o The Peace Corps is the best way in the world to find out what you're made of.
- We came away with a realization that beauty, goodness, intelligence, and wisdom are pretty evenly distributed around the world, even if healthcare, education, opportunity and freedom are not.
- o My faith in the basic goodness of humanity grew during my three years living in a Muslim village in Niger.
- o I found that the guys who have it a little rough and who have a lot of contact with the Libyans are most happy. The volunteers who are living with other Americans are the most dissatisfied although they eat American food and have nice houses.
- Thanks to my consciousness being raised about media bias in the U.S., only discovered when I went overseas, has left me forever careful and skeptical of what I read in the press.
- I believe the Peace Corps made us better citizens of the U.S. and in fact made us citizens of the world.
- o I realized that wars are never started by citizens; they are always started by leaders.
- Wherever people are in the world, let them be helped; whatever their nationality, let them be fed; whatever their beliefs, let them be educated; whatever the color of their skins, let them be freed from disease. Let there be peace.

• Morocco will invest 3.3 billion dollars in the capital Niamey

A Moroccan investment group will invest 3.3 billion dollars (1.824 billion FCFA) in several industrial and infrastructure projects in the Nigerian capital, Niamey, the city authorities and the Moroccan group announced this week. One project consists of construction of an agro-food complex, including fattening of livestock, fodder cultivation, slaughterhouse, meat processing, milk and poultry farming, and construction of a new town with 36,960 social housing units and a shopping center on 1,050 hectares. Other projects aim to create a smart city along the banks of the Niger River, build an industrial zone (intended for export), and install 20,000 solar street lights made in Morocco.

The reform aims above all to rethink the training policy for teachers and supervisors. 
home and work to end the pandemic worldwide, President Biden has promised that the United States will be an arsenal of vaccines.

2) Grant and project updates

Several of the projects funded in July have already made great progress with two of them at or near completion and others off to a good start!

COMPLETED: Tchizamene Clinic Solar Batteries & Beds, Organisation Vie et Développement The community of Danat, with about 4000 inhabitants, is situated 150 km from Agadez and 100 km from Arlit. The medical clinic has limited supplies and equipment to provide health care which is in even higher demand in the rainy season. In the past due to lack of beds, the patients were treated outside with IV bags hanging from trees and motorcycle handlebars.

Funding from generous Friends of Niger donors provided 10 beds for the clinic as well as updated batteries for solar lighting and refrigeration of medicines. The FON award of \$3418 was sent in August, the purchases have been made and the equipment is installed and in service as of September.

COMPLETE - Pending Final Report: Bangiya Elementary School Desks, Bangiya Village Cooperative: \$1643

The 30 table/desks have been manufactured and delivered to the village in time for the opening of classes.


IN PROGRESS: Bio-control of millet borer, Potentiel Terre

This project with the potential to significantly help villagers to control a major millet pest is already off and running. The NGO Potentiel Terre started by garnering support from authorities at local and regional levels before launching into village-level outreach and training. The importance of the project was underlined by the active participation of the Maire de Mokko, who not only travelled to villages to help with outreach, but also contributed funding to help distribute wasps in 10 villages this season. Outreach sessions touched over 200 heads of household, and provided valuable feedback and ideas from villagers about how to best implement the project. Have any of you visited or worked in any of these villages: Sabbu-day, Tibbo-Beeri, Dareki Koira-zeno, Koli-Bagonda, Katize, Djanbaba-day, Dareki Koira-teji, Koirategui-Koli, Cirobi-day, Yawna?











Native wasps that have been reproduced in controlled conditions are being distributed to farmers who will release them in fields in the fight against millet borers. Soon villagers will be able to reproduce populations locally for reintroduction against the pests.

Thanks to our Proposal Reviewers! -- Getting ready for round 2 of grant awards 2021. Many thanks to the dozen or so FON members who have stepped up and volunteered to help review our grant proposals in November. 

• Cure Salée: Niger's Salt Cure Festival

The Cure Salée or "Festival of the Nomads" is a ceremony that marks the end of the rainy season, which falls in September. Make an extreme journey to the deepest Sahara to watch a beauty contest.

The competition drew racing camels from across Niger – and further afield – to the oasis town of Ingall, the country's traditional gateway to the Sahara and scene of the annual Cure Salee gathering of Tuareg and Wodaabe nomads.

But it was Moussa, 10 yrs old – more used to long, hot days tending his father's cattle in the desert – who won



Saturday's big race. Moussa does not go to school but has been riding camels, the speedy, finicky animals that are a hugely important part of life in the Sahara, since he was three years old. Successive governments have managed the economy correctly, keeping inflation below 3%, budget deficits below 4% and public debt at around 44% of gross domestic product (GDP), to the point that the Bank World Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF) describe its risk of debt distress as "moderate".
