Most recently funded grants:

Fossil Lab Internship/Fossil Lab, University of Chicago \$4,960

Internship for one Nigerienne at University of Chicago Fossil Lab to include both remote and on-site training on handling and archiving fossils as well as assistance with applying to graduate schools. The trainee will eventually return to Niger to assume responsibilities as a museologist for preservation of fossils found in Niger and to train other students interested in museology.

Youth Recycling Program/Potentiel Terre \$5,977

Unemployed youths will collect and sort plastics for recycling resulting in community cleanup and economic opportunity for individuals. Dosso Region

Literacy for Vocational Students/Dispositif d'Initiatives pour les Metiers de l'Artisanat \$5,000 Ensure 120 vocational education students achieve a basic level of literacy. Equip three

classrooms and provide the first 9 months of training in foundational education (reading, writing, English, French, arithmetic). Niamey

IMini Potable Water System/Assemblée des Formateurs et Animateurs des Assoc. \$5,303

Install solar water supply equipment and construct a cement storage tank with a metal cover. Distribute water to homes, school and health clinic. Agadez Region

Goat Kits For Vulnerable Women/SCOOP-S KOKARI de Bargouma \$4,321

Provide 45 women members of the Simplified Cooperative Society (KOKARI) in the village of Bargouma with goat kits (goats and initial feed and medicines). Provide training in goat husbandry. Zinder Region

Agricultural Future - Faculty Development/Récupération des Mendiants \$5,186

Provide comprehensive training in agribusiness, modern research tools, and job application skills for future Agricultural faculty members at the Faculty of Agriculture, University Abdou Moumouni. Enhance library resources with updated computers and software.

Well Construction Fatabadje / AFESE - NANAAY \$5,709

Drill borehole in the hamlet of Fatabadjé, near Hamdallaye, to improve the living conditions of the population by facilitating access to drinking water near households.

Agricultural Processing and Marketing Iferouane/TAMAKRAST NIGER \$4,866

Train 40 women members of the Iferouane Cooperative in Financial management, food processing and conservation techniques. Provide food processing and conservation equipment.

Cement Well for Drinking Water/Kouldjami Elhadji Issa \$3,951

Construct a cement-lined well to provide drinking water for a community in Zinder region.

3) The Beat Goes On: More Tuareg Guitar Goodness from Niger

Last month's newsletter included a great segment by Scott Youngstedt on the incredible trajectory of Tuareg guitar music in recent years (tanimert houlane, Scott!). As Scott shared, artists like <u>Tinariwen</u>, <u>Bombino</u>, and <u>Mdou Moctar</u> have all been touring this summer. Even as many of their North America tours begin to wind down, there are still opportunities to see some of them nearby. Many have also announced fall tours—check the dates in the June newsletter or at the links above.

One of the incredible parts of the global story of Tuareg guitar is that there have not just been a few celebrated voices—like the stars mentioned above—but a whole efflorescence of artists sharing their talents with the world. Whether you're hooked on the Tuareg sound or just want to support Nigérien musicians, here are a couple other developments to look out for.

If you're missing the *ambiance* of an Agadez wedding, check out the new single <u>"Ighre Massina"</u> (I Call Out to My Creator) by Etran de l'Aïr. Formed in 1995, they're one of the longest-running wedding groups in town, masterfully weaving the Tuareg sound with the lyrical riffs and rollicking bass lines of other popular Nigérien guitar styles (think Tal National). Etran are wrapping up a packed summer tour with <u>more dates planned this fall</u> as they launch their forthcoming album, <u>100% Sahara Guitar</u>.

Another exciting recent development is that the artist **Boubé**, born in Iférouane, has settled into an active musical life in Montréal. If you didn't catch him in the Agadez scene, you might recognize him as the drummer on several tours with Bombino or Mdou Moctar over the years. He's now leading his own group and recently played the celebrated Nuits d'Afrique festival. Check out his album *Issaktan* on YouTube and his upcoming performances around Québec.

While they haven't announced any upcoming NA plans, it's always a great idea to keep an eye out for many other Tuareg artists with roots in Niger: <u>Les Filles de Illighadad</u>, <u>TisDass</u> (plus Wisskarad, a new project by TisDass leader Moussa Albadé), and <u>Kader Tarhanine</u>, among others.

Finally: **Tinariwen** are heralded as the originators of the Tuareg "desert blues" sound, but the *ishumar* style traces its roots in Niger through the late **Abdallah Ag Oumbadougou**. Earlier this year saw the release of a new career retrospective, including many previously unavailable recordings and extensive liner notes by former Tinariwen manager Andy Morgan: <u>Amahar: The Godfather of Tuareg Music, Vol. 1</u>. This collection helps celebrate this legendary man whose songs constitute the core of Niger's Tuareg guitar repertoire.

4) We Mourn the Loss of John Soloninka, Past President FON

John Soloninka passed away August 6th, 2024 at The James Cancer Hospital in Ohio. John was so well loved by those who knew him in Niger!! His work with Lutheran World Relief promoted gardening as a means to improve nutrition and generate income in remote and rural areas throughout Niger. He befriended many Peace Corps Volunteers and partnered with them to extend the reach and benefit of programs.

"Everyone who knew John loved him. He was so generous. We had such good times and good meals at his house. His house, which was always a home for us." - Daniel McCormick

"John was the perfect liaison between the volunteer world and the NGO/International Development world. I think he mentored many of us who continued in that world and always appreciated and respected the work the Peace Corps Volunteers were doing in the field. It was great to talk shop or unwind on the weekends with him." - L Eric Lindberg

After returning to the US, John kept up his friendships through the Friends of Niger organization. Indeed, John played a big role in FON. He started out serving as recording secretary from 1998 to 2000. After that, the group was inactive for a couple of years and John stepped up to bring it back to life. He served as president of the Friends of Niger from 2006 to 2015. We have so much to thank him for.

John will be remembered very fondly by many and he will be missed.

Floods are hitting Niger hard:

Floods have claimed 217 lives, injured 200, and affected over 350,000 people across Niger in the past three months, according to Nigerien authorities. The capital Niamey has been nearly isolated due to exceptional river flooding caused by heavy rains since June, submerging the city's main exit routes. The flooding has displaced 11,500 residents in Niamey alone, according to the latest official figures. *From Sahel Research Group, 22 August 2024*



Inondations au Niger : 217 morts, 353 287 sinistrés, et 12 milliards de FCFA mobilisés sur fonds propres pour faire face à la crise

Un bilan tragique a été dressé : 217 personnes ont perdu la vie, dont 108 par noyade et 109 à la suite de l'effondrement de leur habitation. En outre, 200 personnes ont été blessées et des milliers de familles sont aujourd'hui sans abri. Le bilan des destructions matérielles est également accablant : 46 525 ménages sinistrés, 39 479 maisons effondrées, et 16 965 têtes de bétail décimées. Medical costs reduced : Le Niger réduit à 50% les frais de soins médicaux

Annoncée le 22 août, cette réforme touche les établissements de santé publics. À partir du 1er septembre, les tarifs diminueront pour les consultations, les hospitalisations et les examens. Parmi les autres allégements sont aussi: l'accouchement qui sera désormais gratuit, la suppression du forfait à vie de 150.000 FCFA pour la dialyse.

U.S. military completes withdrawal from key drone base in Niger

WASHINGTON, Aug 5 (Reuters, Reporting by Idrees Ali) - The United States military has completed its withdrawal from air base 201 in Niger, officials said on Monday, after Niger's ruling junta ordered nearly 1,000 U.S. military personnel to leave following a coup last year. Air base 201, a drone base near Agadez in central Niger that was built at a cost of \$100 million, had provided crucial intelligence about Islamist militant groups before the coup.

"The effective cooperation and communication between the U.S. and Nigerien armed forces

ensured that this turnover was finished ahead of schedule and without complications."
