

# 4) Grant making cycle for 2025- call for volunteers

The 2025 grant calendar has been established. Applications must be received by **May 16, 2025**. Please note that the results of the competition will be announced no later than August 15, 2025. Therefore, no proposed activity should be scheduled to begin before the announcement.

Members can participate in several ways.

- 1. Share the Info email the grant information to potential grant applicants
- 2. <u>Help Develop a Proposal</u> work with someone in Niger to help them develop a competitive proposal
- 3. <u>Volunteer on the Grant Review Team</u> work with a small group to review a batch of proposals and make funding recommendations
- 4. <u>Volunteer to be a Project Champion</u> each funded grant is assigned a champion to act as liaison, coach and mentor

I wanted to share a few thoughts for those of you who might be thinking about being a grant reviewer. The review cycle I participated in was a great experience. And as it worked out, we funded a grant in my village, Ouallam. I can say that Amy and the FON crew are real pros at organizing a decision-making process and the grant applications we had to read were strong. If you've never given away grants before, it can be very rewarding. And

# 5) Nigerien Nonprofit Survey

In March 2024 we invited NGOs to participate in a survey designed to explore the status of NGOs in Niger. The purpose of the survey was twofold. On the one hand we wanted to better understand the needs of potential grantees in order to tailor our own programs. On the other hand, we wanted to be able to describe NGO work in Niger to others who might be unfamiliar yet interested in supporting the great grassroots work.

The survey represents a small sample and is not an exhaustive study. Some interesting tidbits that we learned from the sixteen organizations who replied to the survey include:

- All NGOs are registered with the Niger government
- Typical staffing is 4-6 full time positions
- Good use of volunteers and interns
- Women are well-represented in leadership
- Most governing boards are elected by the membership of the organization or in open forums
- A majority of organizations offered multiple programs
- More than half of the NGOs work with international partners who provide a range of support
- Sources of funding vary, nearly all list some form of local contribution

## 7) In Brief

We extend our condolences to the friends and families of Jim Ekstrom and David Nicholas.

**Jim Ekstrom**, who was Country Director in Niger from July 1973-April 1976, died on January 26, 2025. He had Alzheimer's, and died from his heart simply stopping. He is survived by his wife of 62 years--January 26th was actually their 62nd year anniversary; his son, Matt, 53, daughter Rebekah, 50, who was born in Niger at the Gamkalley Clinic, and youngest, Jessica, 46, conceived in Cameroon but born in the USA; and seven wonderful grandchildren.

Jim and Leslie served as PCVs in Nigeria, 1963-1965, both of them taught English as a Second Language, at the then called, Provincial Secondary School, Funtua.

**David Nicholas**, M.D. passed away on May 8, 2023 in Ashburn Virginia. He loved his time in Niger and signed up for an extra year which influenced his subsequent career in medicine and working in international health programs.

The URC (University Research Co.) family mourns the passing of David D. "Dave" Nicholas, MD, MPH, former URC Senior Vice President who was responsible for the development of URC's global leadership in health care quality improvement. Dave was a pediatrician and public health expert who was admired by all who worked with him as a man of tremendous integrity, humanity, and commitment to improving health services and health outcomes. He recruited and hired many of URC's quality improvement and health systems strengthening experts and was a true servant leader and mentor to all.

**Lasting Impact.** After graduating from Yale Medical School, Dave did a Rotating Internship at the University of Oregon Medical School Hospital in Portland. He then served as a Peace Corps doctor in Niger from 1963-1966, where the Maternal and Child Health Program he helped develop with the Peace Corps Volunteers still operates today. Dave returned from Africa to complete his residency in Pediatrics at Columbia University Medical Center/Babies Hospital from 1966-1969, where he met his wife, Carole.
