1) Supporting our members caught in the current chaos



2) Grant cycle 2025 kicks off with a bang

We are currently very busy reviewing grant applications. We received a record 88 applications across a wide range of sectors including agriculture, water, women's empowerment, health, and others. As a matter of practicality, our screening for eligibility has gotten more stringent. To make the best use of our volunteer time and improve our chances of funding projects that are successful, we winnowed the group of applications to be reviewed by our teams to 42—still a lot to review! While many worthy ideas were presented, the two most common disqualifiers were asking for too much money and providing inadequate description of how the work would be accomplished. The review teams are led by Mary Abrams, JoAnn Lewis, Alix Fedoruk, Scott Youngstedt, Amy Wilson and Douglas Steinberg. Each team has 2-3 additional volunteers and they will each review 7-8 proposals. Preliminary reviews indicate that we have many strong applications and therefore will have some difficult decisions to make.

Grant Management Committee Chair Mary Abrams offered an orientation for reviewers via Zoom on May 28. We are very pleased that 20 FON members have volunteered to review applications! Each volunteer will spend a few hours reviewing and scoring the proposals which have all been translated into English. Then the six small groups will meet from June 15 to June 20 to discuss their findings and make recommendations to the Grants Committee. The Board will make final decisions in early July. After final vetting of recipients, applicants will be notified of our decisions no later than August 16.

3) National Peace Corps Association Conference July 18-20 Washington

NPCA is organizing Peace Corps Connect: Building Bridges at Home and Abroad at Washington School of Law, American University, Washington DC.

Many activities are planned including speakers, a job fair, a service opportunity, embassy visits, Hill Day to educate lawmakers and more. Affiliate groups—THAT'S US—will have a room set up for tables to tell their story and connect members.

4) Grantees implement Special Capacity Building

Several of our special capacity grants have been completed and reports have been provided. These special grants were provided through a non-competitive process where recipients were chosen based on the proven track record with funding we provided. Each recipient was asked to submit a plan of how they would use the funding, which we then approved with some adjustments, suggestions and feedback where needed. This one-time targeted funding was a great way to support good work and build capacity.

25-03 Special Capacity Tamakrast write up by Madalynn Paquette

Recent strong performances in grant implementation made Tamakrast an obvious choice for a special capacity grant. In our first joint venture they demonstrated their mettle by finding a workable solution when a garden borehole came up dry. After that initial project they have completed two excellent projects working with women's groups to add value to agricultural products and market them.

To strengthen their scope, Tamakrast developed a multi-faceted capacity-building initiative that targets both material and human resource development. The intervention addressed critical organizational needs through strategic equipment acquisition, including a motorcycle for field monitoring and organizational mobility. To enhance administrative efficiency and workload, essential

office supplies such as computers and printers were purchased. Central to the project was an extensive training program on project proposal development, which engaged not only Tamakrast's members but also extended to broader network partners and volunteers. The training component proved to be



the most successful aspect of the project, attracting twenty participants from various NGOs and associations in the Agadez region and generating significant satisfaction among attendees. The initiative's impact extended beyond the immediate training, fostering ongoing collaboration among participating organizations through the establishment of a WhatsApp group for information sharing and joint project development. This collaborative network has continued to function, with participants sharing funding opportunities such as the Friends of Niger grant calls and expressing strong interest in future training sessions. The positive feedback demonstrates the project's lasting value in strengthening the local NGO ecosystem's capacity for proposal writing and partnership development.







25-02 Special Capacity MICA

FON has a long-standing relationship with MICA, dating back to support for oxcart projects in the 2000s. Most recently we have supported their mentorship work with teenage girls in partnership with Expanding Lives [https://www.expandinglives.org/], a successful school latrine project in Tchadaoua and a training program on income generating activities for young girls who were serving as guides for family members engaged in begging as a means of income. All of these projects have been very successfully completed.

MICA has always shown creativity, integrity and determination in meeting their mission. With that in mind it was easy to select them as a recipient of a special capacity grant. This grant was a way of recognizing their organizational achievements and helping them be even better positioned for success.

When offered the opportunity they elected to improve the capacity of the training facility through the purchase of new sewing & knitting machines, a gas stove, laptops, benches and renovating existing equipment. They also provided training tailored to the needs of core staff in using computers and instructional methodology. Lastly, they purchased two motorcycles which will allow staff to move around the city to conduct business and provide support and follow-up with program participants.











The purchases and activities were all quickly completed and photos, videos and "factures' were provided. The director sent this note on completion:

Sachant que les impacts seront mesurables à long terme, nous vous assurons de vous faire part des résultats obtenus du projet . . . Merci pour votre soutien. CHAIBOU ABDOU

Hausa Becomes the National Language of Niger. Niger's government has made Hausa the national language of Niger, replacing French. In addition, English and French are now the "working languages" of Niger and nine other languages are recognized as "spoken languages."

Algeria Deports 1,845 Migrants to Niger. On April 19, the government of Algeria deported 1,845 West and Central Africans to the Nigérien Sahara 15 kilometers from the nearest town. In recent years, Niger has become the primary corridor for West and Central African migrants seeking to get to North Africa and Europe. Migrants have faced frequent expulsions from Algeria and serious problems in Libya where many have been enslaved and killed.

Terrorists Kill 58 Nigérien Troops in Eknewane, Tahoua Region. On May 25, Islamic State in the Greater Sahara (ISGS) attacked a military base in Eknewane, near the border with Mali, killing 58 Nigérien soldiers and looting weaponry and supplies. Security has deteriorated in Niger in the last two years, as ISGS, Al Qaeda, and affiliated jihadist and terrorists have killed hundreds of troops and thousands of civilians.
